The World of ABC Missions . . The Heart of ABC

In our last issue of The Oregon Baptist we learned about the role of United Mission in the American Baptist Mission Support budget. UM provides the foundation of support for God's mission through us.

In this issue we want to look at the opportunities that the individual offerings provide for churches and individuals desiring to give additional fund to those areas of mission and ministry especially dear to their hearts.

The five main offerings we receive have specific objectives that I will attempt to summarize here. What we call "the four quarterly offerings" are received by our national partners. The fifth, the regional offering, was only recently approved under the budget covenant, and has only recently been given much attention here in ABC of Oregon.



In the springtime our churches receive the **America For Christ (AFC)** offering. AFC is the American Baptist response to the needs of home missions within and beyond the local congregation in witness and service for Christ as mandated by the Great Commission. Gifts are channeled through National Ministries and Regional Ministries to fund home mission, education and local community ministries. As the name implies, monies given to AFC support work throughout the United States and Puerto Rico. These include Alaskan and Native American ministries, Neighborhood Centers, Refugee Resettlement, Homes and Hospitals, etc.

During the summer months we focus on the **One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS)** OGHS is the American Baptist response to worldwide disaster relief and development. One Great Hour of Sharing, in cooperation with other denominations, is a channel for national and international aid in times of crisis. Our responses to hurricanes, earthquakes, and tsunamis have been made possible by generous gifts to OGHS.

Autumn is when we direct our attention specifically to our international missions through the **World Mission Offering (WMO)**. Monies given toward the ministry of a specific IM missionary (for example, if you are a part of their Mission Partnership Team (MPT) should be given to the WMO and designated for that missionary.)

Christmastime brings us to the **Retired Ministers and Missionaries Offering (RMMO)**. RMMO is the American Baptist thank you - and response to emergency needs of - retired ministers and missionaries, and surviving spouses.

The **Region Offering (aka Oregon for Christ)** is received throughout the year in different ways by our churches. Some earmark Easter, Thanksgiving, or Christmas offerings to the region, others receive special offerings on fifth Sundays. Individuals can designate "region offering" on their offering envelopes. Church planting and

church revitalization are made possible through gifts to the Region Offering.

One of the invaluable services provided by the quarterly offering calendar is the opportunity to educate our churches and their members about the vast variety of mission and ministry being accomplished collectively by our mission partners. When the offering information packets arrive at the churches they include bulletin inserts, DVDs, newsletter stories, and many other resources that make for effective mission education and awareness.

Last fall we published the 2010 United Missions totals for each of our churches. Those figures did not tell the complete story of the generosity of our member congregations. Below are the 2010 Offerings totals for each of the churches that were a part of ABCO for all of 2010.

American Baptist Women are . . . *different!*

American Baptist women in Oregon do not wear blinders. They watch from regular pews, from usual tables at pot lucks, from monthly circle meetings. They watch not with a critical eye; but rather, an observant one. They see younger women and girls moving about the church, having a good time. And AB women like what they see.

“We all remember how it was when we were that age”, remarks one AB woman with a smile. “The clothes, the mannerisms, the music... So much is different with these gals, but not all “different” is bad. It’s just...*different!*”

Intergenerational ministry often hits a snag as those of one generation don’t understand the spiritual trappings of another. Often the hang-up is simply a cultural thing, like comparing hymns of the early 20th century, to Jesus music of the 70s, to mystical melodies of postmodern worshippers. It could be an ap-

proach to prayer such as posture, candles or incense, or a different way of offering communion.

AB women don’t run from these differences. They are interested in learning about the stuff they observe: why do you do it that way, what does it mean to you, can you teach me how to do it? Of course, like all the rest of us, some things are best viewed from arm’s length, knowing that it’s perfectly alright in some instances to sit in the stands...not *everybody* needs to be on the playing field!

AB women are excited about their younger counterparts. They know that God’s kingdom will continue to move forward because of these strong young women. They will support them, love them, encourage them, embrace them...clothes, mannerisms, music, and everything in between. Because AB women like what they see!

What Are You Doing for Lent?

Are you doing something for yourself in Lent? Baptists have not always observed Lenten practices, but I've found it valuable to undertake some kind of daily discipline. Giving up coffee or ice cream have been ways to remind myself that God is bigger than my daily indulgences! But you don't have to give something up. During a difficult year, I made my Lenten practice doing something nice for myself every day. It's not too late to start a Lenten practice – Easter isn't until April 24!

Here are a couple of suggestions:

Add some additional daily prayer or spiritual reading. Sacred Space, <http://sacredspace.ie/>, offers a daily prayer/reflection guide. Prayers are available in a number of languages, including Spanish. Another option is The Daily Office, <http://dailyoffice.wordpress.com/>, which you can read online or sign up for e-mails. It also has a Facebook group.

Do something small to help yourself be healthier physically or emotionally. Take a 10-minute walk, read something funny, spend five minutes talking with your spouse about something that is not church-related.

Jeff Savage has found Lent to be a time to “lie fallow, so that you are preparing for new life, new growth.” He tries to find something to do or to give up that fosters that experience. One year his church, First Baptist Church of Springfield, OR, let their congregational business “lie fallow” through Lent. “We had no committee meetings. All we did was worship and Bible study, but no business,” Jeff says. This was one of his most meaningful experiences of Lent.

May these last days before Easter be not simply a time of frantic preparation, but also a time of renewal for you personally.

Joel 2:12-17, Mathew 6:16-21

Lent marks the forty days on the Christian calendar preceding Easter Sunday. During Lent we are called to repentance, self-examination, and reflection. We have the opportunity to contemplate the sacrifice Jesus made so that we can be forgiven of our sins and have the gift of eternal life.

In an effort to focus on the sufficiency of God's grace in our lives, we often choose to "give up" something-- perhaps a favorite dessert, television program, etc. This "giving up" helps remind us that our relationship and devotion to God, and not material possessions or any other distractions of daily living, must take **FIRST** place in our lives. Any practice that brings us closer in our walk with God can certainly contribute to our spiritual growth.

The prophet Joel cautions us that our external practices (the "rending of garments" in the scripture passage) are not enough. Our hearts must be broken in sorrow and sincere repentance resulting in complete renewal and commitment of our hearts and our lives in service to God. And in the gospel of Mathew, Jesus calls us to fast in private, assuring us that our loving Father will see us. Jesus teaches us to focus on Him and recognize the true riches we have as we take up our cross and follow Him. We store up our treasure in heaven, and our hearts will be there also.

May God bless you during this season of reflection and renewal.

Gracious and Loving Father, Forgive us our sins and create in us clean hearts. Refresh our desire to give ourselves to You that we may become all You want us to be. Amen

Cedar Hills Welcomes Thai Dance and Drama Troupe

On April 8th, The Payap University Dance and Drama Team from Chiang Mai, Thailand will perform in Cedar Hills as part of an Asian and Western U.S. Tour. The troupe is composed of seven professional dancers and actors who present an hour-and-twenty minute program featuring dances from various regions of Thailand and a traditional Thai melodrama (Likay) with English translation. The Payap University Dance and Drama Team will perform at **Cedar Hills Baptist Church, 2470 SW Roxbury Avenue, Portland on Friday, April 8th, at 7:00 pm.** The performance is free, an opportunity to contribute to the troupe's tour expenses will be provided.

The team is appearing in colleges and churches in Korea and along the West Coast of the United States. The tour is led by Dr. Esther Wakeman, director of the Christian Communications Institute of Payap University, and her husband, Rev. Rob Collins. The drama is a touching true story about a gangster whose life is

changed in an amazing way.

In 1984, The Royal Thai Government recognized Payap University as the first fully accredited private university in Thailand. The University Communications Institute was founded thirty-three years ago. Its purpose is to communicate Christian truths through the use of Thai cultural expressions. Throughout the year the Institute's performers lead spiritual renewal programs in schools and communities in the rapidly developing Southeast Asian country. The programs include traditional and modern dance, drama, and music. Live performances are featured, as the Institute has a staff of 15 professional artists.

The program offers an excellent opportunity for Americans to experience the beauty and drama of Thai classical art. "We have appeared in the United States several times already," says Collins, "And folks usually comment, 'If we'd known how good this was going to be, we'd have worked harder to promote it.'"
